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Dear Friends of St. Joseph Primary Care,

The Jubilee year of 2025 is an important moment for St. Joseph Primary Care. On February 12, the Diocese of Raleigh marked its 100th anniversary by giving Papal Honor awards to Peter Le, our Executive Director, and 15 others for their outstanding service. On March 17, we expanded our outreach by getting a recreational vehicle, which we are turning into a medical mobile van to help communities across North Carolina and beyond. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, we, at St. Joseph Primary Care, work to live out our mission: to show the "love of God and to love our neighbors [those we serve] as ourselves" by offering excellent, accessible health care and affordable options, including free or low-cost services.

On June 5, Bishop Zarama blessed the medical van, now called "Grace-Mobile." Since then, GraceMobile has completed four medical missions—the first three in Western North Carolina and the fourth in Newton Grove, Eastern NC. GraceMobile has also helped with several outreach programs at St. Ann Catholic Church in Clayton.

As we approach our 12th anniversary in 2026, we acknowledge that the upcoming year may present significant challenges for the two million North Carolinians who risk losing health insurance if Medicaid is not funded. Regardless of these uncertainties, we remain steadfast in our commitment to support and care for our neighbors.

On behalf of our board of directors, we extend our gratitude to our patients, supporters, and volunteers for enabling us to fulfill the Gospel message: to love God and care for our neighbors as ourselves. The Wonders of St. Joseph

St. Joseph Primary Care is looking forward to celebrating our 12th anniversary in 2026. To prepare ourselves, it's good to reflect and thank God for the great things he has done. To highlight the upcoming anniversary, we focus on the nine wonders of St. Joseph that we received since we first opened our doors.

#1 - His Helping Hand

After our grand opening on August 8, 2014, we were seeking a lawyer to file Form 1023 with the IRS to have St. Joseph Primary Care recognized as a nonprofit organization. We didn't know anyone until St. Joseph mysteriously sent DLA Piper, an international law firm based in Raleigh, for pro bono work. We met the attorney, who wanted to help, but he said he wasn't familiar with the Form 1023 filing process. He needed time. Shortly afterward, St. Joseph sent us another mysterious law firm, Batten Lee, LLP, our way. **To our utter surprise**, the two law firms had the same address, both on the third floor. DLP Piper was at the left in suite 350A, Batten Lee was at the right in suite 350B, and neither attorney knew the other. When we met them at their office, the attorneys asked us, "Do you want to meet on the left or on the right?" On that day, we were mesmerized by the Miracle Worker of St. Joseph.

#2 - An Exception

Two months before our grand opening, we contacted Fellowship of Associates of Medical Evangelism (FAME) in Indiana to request donations of medical equipment. But we were turned down. Thirty minutes after hanging up the phone, they called back and made an exception. As a result, we received two pallets of medical equipment valued at over \$10,000.

#3 - Who are you?

In a few months after our grand opening, we received a carbon copy letter from the Bishop of Raleigh, Most Reverend Michael F. Burbidge. The letter addressed to the Pastors of the Raleigh Deanery encouraged them to support the ministry of caring at St. Joseph Primary Care. On February 12, 2015, we attended the Deanery meeting and received a \$10,000 check from our priests. **Note**: For a startup organization wanting to collaborate with the Catholic church, this acted by our bishop and pastors was truly the work of a miracle. Well! St. Joseph is the miracle worker.

#4 - Not a figure lifted!

Whenever we needed equipment, strangers would mysterious show up and deliver it to our doorstep, so we didn't have to lift a finger to move it.

Example 1: When we received the two pallets of medical equipment from FAME, two painters loaded them into our office. The painters were three hours delayed in painting our office. If they came on time, we had no way to unload them.

Example 2: A year later, we needed a phlebotomy chair. We got a mysterious phone call from a stranger in Moncure, NC. He had a brand new chair and was on his way to Raleigh to donate. He brought in the clinic and placed them right where we wanted them.

#5 - \$5,000 from a stranger

When we needed an EKG machine but didn't have \$5,000 to buy one, after many prayers, we decided to buy one anyway. Two hours after placing the order, the postman delivered our daily mail. Out of that, there was a mail, and inside was a \$5,000 check from a stranger.

#6 - Four Zeros

During the COVID-19 pandemic, we received four quarters in a donation from an elderly lady. A few days later, we received five donations in the mail on one day. The first mail was a \$100 cash donation from a priest in Texas. The second was a \$1,000 check. The third and fourth were \$2,000 each. Finally, the last check was for \$5,000 from a priest in Raleigh. Within a few days, we received a \$1 donation that St. Joseph added an additional 0000 to, making \$10,000, plus a \$100 bill as a cash bonus.

#7 - No Danny Boy


In 2021, while we served at a community outreach at St. Francis Catholic Church, Eileen Leamy, one of our volunteers, played cello. A woman came and thanked her for playing her favorite song, "Danny Boy." Eileen was in awe because she had never practiced or played that song. Many years ago, Eileen said a priest blessed her before a performance and said that he would bless her so that she could play what God wanted the people to hear. On that day, St. Joseph blessed Eileen to play "what the people want to hear," with or without Danny Boy.



#8 - The Angel - Chi Nguyen

In summer of 2014, we needed a bilingual CNA but couldn't find one. One day, St. Joseph surprisely sent us an angel out of nowhere. We met Chi Nguyen,

a CNA who spoke fluent Spanish, Vietnamese, and English at a party. Soon, Chi volunteered for nearly a year and now is a physician assistant.

Why name it "St. Joseph Primary Care"

When my wife, Dr. ThuHuong Trinh, asked me to support her in resigning from her medical position and in starting a not-forprofit clinic, I wasn't ready. At that time, I was on sabbatical from my role as a software developer at the Duke Cancer Institute. We were making good money and benefits, and our children were very young. However, after a month-long discernment, I agreed with her. It wasn't an easy decision, but a quote from St. Francis de Sales helped make it possible, for he said, "The God who helped us in the past is helping us now and will continue to help us in the future." Now was the time to draft a business plan. We wanted to structure it as a faith-based 501(c)(3) organization. To name the business, Saint Joseph clearly stood out. He was a foster father to Jesus and a man of faith. In his dream, he obeyed and married Mary. After Jesus was born, again, it was in his dream that he took



Mary and Jesus and migrated to Egypt. America gives us so many blessings. Our dreams are giving back to the community. At first, we thought of being called "St. Joseph Family Practice" or "St. Joseph Family Care." Eventually, we settled on "St. Joseph Primary Care" with the subname "a ministry of caring" because we wanted to be a ministry and not just a business. This year, we modified to be "a ministry of caring in Jesus' name." This way, we hope other Christian denominations can connect with us. St. Joseph, pray for us.

#9 - From Fear to Awe & Wonder



I was nervous about making a business decision to buy the RV to use as a mobile medical van. I asked God for two specific signs that I was doing His will.

First, I asked for a sign to receive a \$20,000. Shortly afterward, on Christmas Eve in of 2024, I received the exact amount from a priest in Newland, NC.

Second, I applied for a loan and thought it could not be approved since St. Joseph Primary Care is a not-forprofit organization. So, I asked for a sign for the bank to approve the loan. Not only did the bank approve the

loan and offer a low interest rate, but they also prepared to make a \$3,000 donation. Plus, they did it in haste at my command.

I learned about discernment the day before this occurrence from St. Ignatius of Loyola. Instead of "fear," I should show "reverence" for God through the spirit of "awe and wonder" and marvel at God's work. Additionally, I discovered that when Christ calls us to follow him, we need not fear telling him what ails us, for he only wants us to delight in Him. With that, I moved from fear to reverence for God and found delight in God.



The Vision of St. Joseph **Primary Care**

Shortly after St. Joseph Primary Care (STJPC) opened for business, I wrote down this vision for how the ministry of caring at STJPC would move forward. I admitted that I was and am a little unclear about how it is possible to accomplish the vision St. Joseph has planned for us. However, by the grace of God, we accomplished many of our goals. Though we may not know where we are going, do not see the road ahead, and cannot know for certain where it will end, thankfully, with the help of St. Joseph and God's mercy, we are now at the crossroads into Phase IV - Missionaries of the Poor.

Phase I - Building a Catholic Healthcare

- 1- Grand Opening on 8/8/2014.

- 4 Visiting seven Catholic churches and sharing the vision of St. Joseph Primary Care with the parishioners.

- 8-The third outreach program was implemented, known as "Free Mammogram," collaborated with REX Healthcare on 3/9/2017.





Phase II - Church-Health Ministry Medical Clinic @ St. Ann Catholic Church

Goal: Working together with churches, medical professionals, and volunteers to practice medicine among the marginalized communities.

On 8/8/2017, St. Joseph Primary Care joined St. Ann Catholic Church in Clayton to open a second clinic to care for our neighbors in Johnston County. When Fr. Peter Grace, pastor at St. Ann, introduced us to the community, he said, "Today is a blessing day for St. Ann, Mary's mother, to work with St. Joseph, her son-in-law."

Phase III Healthcare & Evangelization

We reached three goals in phase III by using healthcare to evangelize. First, we connected the Church-Health Ministry with local hospitals. Second, we worked to bring people back to church. Third, we aimed to "develop a new kind of health care."

1st goal: The late Pope Francis declared 2020 the Year of St. Joseph, marking the 150th anniversary of St. Joseph's designation as patron of the Catholic Church. Little did we know that on April 17, 2021, St. Joseph Primary Care was leading a historic collaboration between WakeMed, UNC Rex Healthcare, Duke Health, Wake County Health Department, Alignment Healthcare, City Pharmacy, and Urban Ministries, along with six diocesan churches and a local bank, to care for our neighbors during the COVID-19 pandemic. It was a rare and perhaps the only time in history that churches and healthcare professionals in Wake County came together for one common good, caring for the people. On that one day, we cared for 1,901 people.

2nd goal: St. Joseph Primary Care has always been aligned in accordance with the tradition of Christian healthcare and the teachings of the Christian faith. Thus, we aim our ministry in a church setting where we bring people together to "care, welcome, and serve" one another. Whenever we offer our services, we are "bringing people back to the church" in a unique way.

3rd goal: Our business model is a "Direct Primary Care" (DPC). When we started in 2014, DPC was somewhat foreign to people, and we had to explain the concept. But now, it has become a trend in the healthcare industry. In a small way, we are glad to accomplish our third objective.


a ministry of caring in Jesus' name



The goal of this phase is simple: each Diocese (in the United States) ought to have a Catholic medical clinic modeled like St. Joseph Primary Care. At first glance, this goal seems impossible, and it may be so. However, here are some interesting facts worth pondering. Fact 1: In 2023, my first book was published by Ave Maria Press at the University of Notre Dame (title: My Life of Grace: How I Found Hope and Purpose in Suffering). Since then, I have traveled throughout America and Ireland to give talks on the "gift of suffering." I have appeared on multiple television and radio stations, including EWTN. In a small way, the "ministry of caring in Jesus' name" has already begun, and it slowly forms in a most unexpected way. Fact 2: Last year, when Hurricane Helene destroyed many parts of Western NC, we spent nearly six weeks, on almost every weekday and weekend, caring for our neighbors. Western NC is part of the Diocese of Charlotte. We intend to care for them for many more years. Fact 3: I serve on the advisory board of Regina Caeli Clinic in New Hampshire. Fact 4: Every now and then, I received phone calls from people out of state who wanted to open a Catholic clinic like St. Joseph Primary Care in their states. With that said, could it be that the vision for St. Joseph Primary Care, phase IV, has already begun? Lastly, I would like to share a quote from St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, who famously said, "The Heart of Jesus does things in such a hurry that I can barely keep up with Him." After all, in the short time she had lived in America, she successfully built 67 charitable institutions, including hospitals, schools, and or-phanages.
